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From the Head of College

Marist College Ashgrove was established in 1940 by the Marist Brothers. The founder of Marist Education, St Marcellin Champagnat, a priest from Southern France, was changed due to an experience of blessing a dying boy, only to see that he had little education and no understanding of God. His passion and determination to then start a religious order to address this concern led to schools being established throughout the world, including Australia and Ashgrove in Brisbane. Marist College Ashgrove has been an integral part of boys' education in Queensland for over 80 years.

Our College Mission is to educate boys in this Marist tradition and charism inspired by St Marcellin Champagnat, encouraging young men to love all people equally, be life-long learners, to lead positively and to serve all, especially those in need. Our vision is to provide a holistic education



- Country Areas: Our catchment of boarding students extends from remote areas of the Northern Territory (Anula), Western Queensland (Mitchell, Cloncurry, Longreach and Quilpie) to Northern NSW (Lightning Ridge, Walgett and Yetman)
- FFPOS: Eight (8) mostly from PNG, Hong Kong and Solomon Islands
- A limited number of weekly boarders are accommodated in the senior residences on a case by case basis where families are seeking weekly boarding arrangements. Priority is given to Year 12 applications.

HISTORY OF THE MARIST BROTHERS

The Marist Brothers is a Religious Institute founded in France in 1817 by a young French priest, Marcellin Champagnat.

Born in a mountain village in the south of France, the son of a farmer, Marcellin grew up in the years of the French Revolution. His formal schooling did not begin until he was fifteen years old. To the surprise of his family and friends, he decided to become a priest, and, in spite of many difficulties, he did so.

He considered his mission in life was to make Jesus known and loved and to do so by creating schools which not only taught secular subjects, but also Religious Education and the Catechism.

The Institute began with a network of small schools conducted by the Brothers who lived in the villages with the people. By the time of Marcellin's death in 1840 there were 278 Brothers and his system of education had begun to expand throughout France.

Over the next 50 years the Brothers expanded across all continents and established a system of education worldwide. Today, the Brothers' schools exist in 78 countries. There are about 5,000 Brothers and 35,000 lay teachers working in Marist schools today.

The first Marist Brothers arrived in Australia in 1872 and established schools in Sydney. In 1929, the Brothers established their first school in Brisbane at Marist College Rosalie and then in 1940 at Marist College Ashgrove. Today there are over 50 schools in the association of Marist Schools in Australia (MSA), representing schools begun by the Marist Brothers, Marist Sisters and Marist Fathers.

MARIST COLLEGE ASHGROVE

Marist College Ashgrove began in 1940 with Brother Ignatius O'Connor as its first Head of College. The College is built on the site formerly used by Father Walter Cain and his proposed Missionary Order. The only permanent building was the Tower Block whose graceful architecture has made it the symbol of the entire College. Despite temporary evacuation and re-location during World War II, the College flourished and developed. There has been an almost continuous building program over the last 30 years, and the number of students has grown from the original 70 in 1940 to over 1,700 today.

The reputation of the College has steadily grown since 1940 and has been extended with its loyal supporters and Old Boys. It is respected throughout Australia, Papua New Guinea, Solomon Islands and the wider Asia Pacific region as a significant institution expressing the very best in Marist educational values and teaching.

COLLEGE BADGE AND MOTTO

When the Marist Brothers began their College at Ashgrove in 1940, the first Head of College, Br Ignatius O'Connor, took many of the details of the new crest from another great Marist College, St Joseph's, at Hunters Hill in Sydney.

The central motif was that of the Cross, with the quadrants of the shield being filled with the lamp and book (learning), the Southern Cross (Australia), the Marist AM Monogram with its twelve stars (Our Lady) and the initials S.M.C. standing for the name first used for the school (St Mary's College). The original motto was an Old Testament phrase, "Posuerunt Me Custodem" (They have placed me as guardian), referring to the Blessed Mother. The College colours were royal blue (top right and bottom left quadrants) and gold (the Cross), with the other two quadrants in white.

The motto of the College was changed in 1957 to "Viriliter Age" (Act Courageously), an admonition found in the Old and New Testaments, and in 1970 the new name adopted was Marist College Ashgrove, with its initials M.C.A. The College colours, royal blue and gold, have remained unchanged since the founding of the College.


The crest is now familiar and well loved by thousands of past and present students, parents and supporters. May it continue to inspire all of us to "Act Courageously" in all aspects of College life.

2022 Undertakings and Achievements

- 99.7% of students attained their QCE.

- NAPLAN SUCCESS: improvement in the areas of reading, writing, spelling, grammar and punctuation and numeracy from Years 5 to 7 and 7 to 9. The average score above the national average for all Years 5, 7 and 9 in all areas of reading, writing, spelling, grammar and punctuation, and numeracy has increased from 4.92% in 2019 to 6.26% in 2022 above the National Average a 21% improvement overall.

Marist College Ashgrove's curriculum offerings provide focused, relevant and challenging opportunities to enable young men to engage in their learning. The College offers an extensive range of subjects which cater to the interests and talents of our students while providing pathways into post-schooling education or work.

Students in Years 5 to 6 complete a broad range of subjects in alignment with the Australian Curriculum. For the core subjects of Religion, English, Maths, Science, Humanities and Social Sciences students remain with their core classroom teacher. For specialist subjects including Physical Education, Languages, Music, Art and Technology students work with specialist teachers utilising the resources of the Secondary School. Across the Primary School there is a clear focus on developing the fundamental skills in literacy and numeracy which allow students to engage with curriculum across all subject areas.

In the Middle School, Years 7 to 9 our students continue to further develop their literacy and numeracy skills with a cross-curricular focus on the reading, writing and numeracy. Students complete both core subjects (Religion, Maths, English, Humanities, Science and Physical Education) as well as many elective courses in accordance with the Australian Curriculum. In Year 7, students undertake a predetermined program allowing them to experience many of the subject offerings available to them. As students move through the Middle School, they are able to select their electives of study in alignment with their interests and talents.

The newly developed Year 10 program encourages students to select subjects for the full academic year in preparation for Years 11 and 12. While students have the ability to change courses of study at key junctions throughout the year, the consolidation of the elected courses allows for in-depth groundwork for all senior subjects.

Year 11 and 12 students access the curriculum as prescribed by the Queensland Curriculum and Assessment Authority (QCAA). Students can select from General, General Extension, Applied, Essential and Vocational Education subjects leading to the attainment of QCE (Queensland Certificate of Education) through both ATAR and non-ATAR pathways.

Marist College Ashgrove fosters a climate of academic success for all students by working in partnership with students and families. Information nights, parent/teacher/student interviews, subject selection interviews, academic awards, academic interviews, Optimus breakfasts as well as many other opportunities allow targeted information, conversations and celebrations of the academic life of the College.

The Primary School at Marist College Ashgrove provides an outstanding opportunity for boys in Years 5 and Year 6 to immerse themselves in College life. This is facilitated through a holistic education focused on the personal, spiritual and academic growth of each student. Our strong pastoral care and academic program ensures that the Primary boys are known, supported and challenged as they transition into their new learning environment. The students benefit from the many exceptional facilities and resources available to them as part of Marist College Ashgrove. Caring for students with different learning needs is a priority. This extends to our excellence program in Writing and Mathematics . The Primary School is purposely located within its own unique precinct on the larger College campus. This provides the boys with a place of belonging as they build valuable relationships with their peers and teachers to start their Marist journey.



Mission and Ministry Program

FAITH LIFE

The Marist theme for 2022 Known and Loved: Dignity for All was a gift for Mission at our College. Every student encountered the theme and its challenge in the Commencement Liturgies in Week 1 of the year. Additionally, we were able to provide, in and around the various COVID-19 restrictions, regular opportunities for reflection, prayer, worship and celebration. These included our four major Eucharistic celebrations -Inaugural Mass, Feast of St Marcellin Mass, Feast of the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary Mass and Graduation Mass. Each week of the school year a College Community Mass was offered before school on Wednesdays. Semester based class Masses were celebrated in Religious Education classes. Houses gathered in the Chapel for Mass or prayer at various times. There was also Reconciliation offered to students in Religious Education classes during the year and available to the College Community each Tuesday morning. Weekly College assemblies began with prayer and music, proclamation of the Gospel by the College Chaplain, Fr Alatini, and a reflection offered by Head of College Mr Newman. Whenever groups gather in the College proceedings begin with prayer. Retreat and reflection experiences for students were offered during the year, the most significant of these being the Years 9 and 10 day retreats, Year 11 Leaders program and the Year 12 three day residential retreat, a great Marist tradition.

The optional Game Changers Marist Youth Ministry Program grew substantially in 2022 with full roll-out to Years 7 to 12. Game Changers has enabled students interested in faith and personal growth to gather and experience with others the best of what the program provides.

Staff formation occurred through the Marist Mission and Life program, weekly staff briefing and meeting prayers, and participation in whole-school gatherings. New staff were inducted into Marist life through inhouse offerings and the Marist Schools Australia induction program. The three-day Marist programs, In the Footsteps of St Marcellin 1 and 2, were held at Mittagong and resumed post-COVID-19. Staff participants in the Association of St Marcellin Champagnat continued to meet and be further immersed in the Marist Way.

RELIGIOUS EDUCATION

The College's Archdiocesan-accredited Religious Education program continues as the mainstay by which students learn about religion. The curriculum engages students around the four key content areas of Sacred Texts, Beliefs, Church and Christian Life with a primary focus on Catholic Christian material but with some exposure to other world religions in the human search for meaning. It is a fully academic program that is formally assessed. It complements the broader religious life of the school where students learn about and practice Marist and Catholic faith and spirituality.

SOLIDARITY AND JUSTICE

In the spirit of our founder, St Marcellin Champagnat, Marist College Ashgrove has a proud history of outreach to others with a particular focus on the vulnerable and marginalised. The Marists Are Taking Everyone Seriously (MATES) Ministry program exists for students, staff and community members to be in solidarity with all whom we encounter. It is designed as a practical witness to our Catholic mission.

The program encompasses agencies and activities, both internally and externally, and focuses on engagement and right relationships with the local, national, and global communities in which we live. We also hope that out of a true sense of solidarity, our students, both past and present, would increasingly be asking questions about 'why' and 'how' the world and her people suffer. While the continuation of the COVID-19 pandemic prevented many of our activities for the 2022 year, the students and staff continued to be of service. The Lenten collection raised money for Marist Solidarity, Caritas and Catholic Mission and was an extraordinarily generous support for the least favoured, especially our Marist cousins in the Asia-Pacific region. All these were a wonderful expression of faith-inaction that we are challenged to practice.

The MATES motto is: Faith to believe; Courage to do.



Boarding

A Marist boarder is underpinned by the core value and virtue of Family Spirit. We develop this by creating a sense of safety, belonging, presence and relationships. Throughout 2022 this was enhanced by our Boarding Theme of 'Community'.

COVID-19 continued to present challenges throughout 2022. As a community and boarding team we continued to be adaptive and flexible with the impacts on boarding. The resilience demonstrated by boarders, families and staff throughout these challenges has been outstanding.

Our boarding visits included trips to Emerald, Goondiwindi, Warwick, Yamba, Darwin, Katherine and Cloncurry. Community visits were a real highlight in 2022 as it helped the College to build and strengthen our boarding community.

Boarding enrolments in 2022 remained steady, however, a clear collaborative marketing and engagement strategy has been developed to increase enrolments in the future.

Pastoral Care Program

STUDENT LEADERSHIP

Student Leadership at Marist College Ashgrove allows our Year 11 young men to become "servant" leaders to prepare themselves for service in their future vocation and the wider community. The Year 11 students undertake direct curriculum on leadership, including training days, practical and theoretical experiences and the expectations to lead and serve in the way of Mary

The Senior Leaders are guided by the School Captain and the five Vice-Captains who oversee the portfolios of Culture, Academics, Sport, Mission and Wellbeing. The portfolio of Wellbeing has been a new inclusion with a focus on mental health initiatives. Each of the eight Houses have five Captains also – each responsible for the five portfolios previously mentioned.

Marist College Ashgrove prides itself on a shared, participative leadership style which allows our Seniors to serve and guide the other boys within the College. The opportunities in the Primary School include a leadership formation program that creates five primary student leaders that assist the student body and staff.

STUDENT WELLBEING AND PASTORAL CARE

The Pastoral Care structure of Marist College Ashgrove is separated into Primary and Secondary sub-schools. The Secondary sub-school pastoral care is organised into a "House" system where students are sorted vertically into eight Houses. Each House is overseen by a Pastoral Leader who is the first point of call for all student matters, and take their boys through from Year 7 to Year 12. Each Pastoral Leader uses a term plan, part of which incorporates peer mentoring within the pastoral group class to cover relevant and key topics of interest decided by the student leadership group. The Primary School operates under a traditional, yearlevel structure where primary teachers are responsible for the pastoral care of the students in their respective classes. Each morning, all students have time to meet with their Pastoral Carer (Pastoral Group Teachers in Secondary, Class teacher in Primary) where we foster a welcoming environment and the relationships that are central to the development of a Marist young man. All students are monitored closely by their respective Pastoral Leader.

During Term 4, with the finalisation of a new Middle Leadership structure, the area of pastoral care was supported by the inclusion of two new positions: Pastoral Leader – Middle School (Years 7 to 9) and Pastoral Leader – Senior School (Years 10 to 12).

All students also undertake the "ASH" Program, which aims to support the teaching of 'the whole child' through the development and implementation of the ASH program. The program is designed for students in Year 5 to Year 12 and aims for all students to:

- · Become good Christians and good citizens
- Develop respectful relationships with themselves and others
- To develop respect for all women
- Encourage independence, resilience, positive social skills and team work
- · Develop impulse control and positive decision making
- · Identify warning signs of mental illness
- · Enhance their personal insight and reflective capacity
- · Increase their empathy for others
- Reduce bullying behaviours
- · Build confident young men who are strong in mind and gentle in heart
- Enhance help-seeking behaviours
- Develop strong leadership skills
- Increase their sense of belonging with their peers and the school

The program is based on the developmental needs of each age group and incorporates evidenced based strategies from areas such as positive psychology, respectful relationships, resilience, cognitive behaviour therapy and emotional regulation. The ASH program is evaluated and updated each year to manage topic relevance for each cohort, in relation to issues of concern in the wider community. The Pastoral Care and Wellbeing program is supported by student participation in student-voice forums, formation camps in Year 7 and 9, peer-mentoring opportunities and retreat days.

To support education through the ASH program, in 2022 the College was able to initiate an association with Mr Paul Dillon, founder and director of Drug and Alcohol Research Agency Australia. Paul is a world-renowned keynote spreader in this area. Paul commits to schools on a three year cycle of educational presentations starting in Year 10 and culminating in Year 12 including parent presentations.



Performing Arts Program

2022 was another outstanding year for Performing Arts at Marist College Ashgrove, with a year full of opportunities for boys to participate in a wide variety of genres in contrasting settings. Despite the continued challenges of COVID-19 the College's choirs, bands, orchestras, small ensembles, and drama groups produced some outstanding outcomes, performing at festivals and events across southern Queensland. Highlights of the year included the Awards Night performances on the Concert Hall stage of the Queensland Performing Arts Centre, the Celebration Concert, Cathedral Concert, Year 5 Musical, Queensland Youth Jazz Festival held at the Brisbane Jazz Club and Big Bands 1 and 2 travelling to Warwick to perform at Jumpers and Jazz in July. Throughout the year over 650 instrumental lessons were conducted each week, with over 700 boys involved in one of the many College Performing Arts groups.

After a of three year break, Marist College Ashgrove once again welcomed The Essentially Ellington Down Under Festival for 2022 hosting 15 Big Bands from across Southern Queensland during the EKKA break. Worldrenowned Trombonist Vincent Gardner and New York Drummer and educator, Jerome Jennings were thoroughly impressed with the standard of groups across the day commenting that it was the highest standard that they had seen in Brisbane since the Festival began in 2016. It was another amazing experience for our Big Band 1 and 2 students being mentored by two of the world's leading jazz musicians in our very own Draney Theatre. Following the festival, our Rhythm section players were selected to be the exemplar players for a Teachers' Professional Development session held at the Jazz Music Institute. The boys once again demonstrated the high level of playing that the College is renowned for and did the College proud. This year we experienced one of the most talented music cohorts in the history of the College with nine boys gaining places into highly competitive Bachelor of Music courses at The Queensland Conservatorium – Griffith University, Queensland University of Technology and The University of Queensland.

The theatre program continued to offer a range of drama-based activities, including inter-school theatre sports and regular public performances. Students from all year levels, and with any amount of experience are encouraged to audition for plays held once per term. A wide variety of plays are performed, ranging from Epic Theatre to Australian Gothic, with students able to be involved on stage as performers, or behind the scenes as directors, backstage helpers, props managers, lighting operators or set designers. It continues to be a wonderful opportunity for boys to meet new people, learn important 21st century skills, develop confidence and take personal and creative risks while challenging themselves.

Theatre Sports has been a proud tradition at the College for more than twenty years offering training to students who wish to be members of an inter-school theatre sports team and compete in the Queensland Youth Theatre Sports competition. Any student who wishes to join is welcome to be involved – even if just to learn the skills, have some fun and challenge themselves to think on their feet. Difficult and often terrifying, theatre sports is nevertheless a strong skills-building co-curricular activity that allows students to develop important 21st century skills of teamwork, decision-making, improvisation, communication and creative problem-solving.

THEATRE ASH

Marist College Ashgrove has a co-curricular theatre program, Theatre Ash. Commencing in 2020, the theatre program offers a range of theatre-based activities, including regular public performances, a school-wide creative playwriting competition, and inter-school theatre sports teams.

Students with any amount of experience, ranging from none to many years, and from all year levels, are encouraged to audition for plays held once per term. A wide variety of plays are performed, ranging from Realism, Melodrama, to Epic Theatre, with students encouraged to be involved on stage as performers, or behind the scenes as backstage helpers, directors, props managers or set designers. They can also be co-lead as a director or producer. It is a wonderful opportunity for boys to learn important 21st century skills, meet new people, take personal and creative risks, and develop confidence while challenging themselves and pushing their own boundaries.

2022 saw the preparation of a performance of The Trolleys by Australian playwright Sara West. This play is a post-apocalyptic piece about a group of teenagers who have to band together to survive. Each carries a tiny light in a jar, which they must keep 'alive' in order to preserve their humanity. A mysterious stranger appears who promises hope in a bleak landscape. Featuring students from Years 7 to 12, this performance also included students as set designers and lighting operators to bring the story to life.

The second semester of 2022 involved a second Theatre Ash performance – Scattered Lives by award-winning Australian playwright, Sally McKenzie. This is an Epic and Verbatim Theatre piece about stories of refugees who came to Australia, escaping persecution in other countries. It uses the actual words of refugees, mixed with fictionalised scenes, to bring these refugee stories to life and share extraordinary experiences of survival, trauma and hope. This was performed in October with a variety of students from Years 7 to 12 drawing together for this emotional performance.

Theatre Ash is also developing other drama-based activities, such as social role-playing games, which build skills as well as providing social opportunities for boys, and scriptwriting workshops and competitions for students who have a creative lean and wish to develop these skills. An annual scriptwriting competition allows boys to submit scripts for consideration, which will be used for a student showcase.

For students who would like to engage in fun and challenging activities that support the academic program, Theatre Ash has something for everyone!

Sport Program

Sport is central to a Marist College Ashgrove education. Learning to win and lose, to lead and be led, to push oneself to and perhaps beyond one's limits, to think as part of a team, to know when to strive for more and when to acknowledge defeat; these are all part of learning to be human. Consequently, Marist College Ashgrove aims to give every boy the chance to benefit from learning through sport by playing and being taught the sport of his choice at the level appropriate to his abilities and interest. Marist College Ashgrove offers a variety of sports and sporting competitions throughout the year.

All students participate in a summer sport and a winter sport of their choice. The boys benefit from working with the College's experienced coaches as well as a comprehensive strength and conditioning program. The College has a rich history and tradition in a number of sports and prides itself on its sporting success, both in terms of results and also

developing young men of character. Marist College is a member of the Associated Independent Colleges (A.I.C.) in Brisbane where it competes on a weekly basis against like schools across the school year.

In the past 12 months Marist College has won AIC championships in Cross Country and Track and Field and finished second in Cricket and Swimming.

The College prides itself on its participation model and regularly fields up to six teams per year level across the sports.

The College facilities include a state of the art swimming complex, seven full-sized sports fields, six tennis courts, synthetic and turf cricket nets, a two-court indoor sports hall and a strength and conditioning centre.



Visual Art

The creative talents of Visual Art students at Marist College Ashgrove are nurtured through ongoing opportunities to display their work in art exhibitions, to enter and be recognised for their outstanding work in art competitions and to collaborate with professional artists and designers through participation in workshops.

The Tower Art Show, an annual event, provides all students from Years 5 to 12 with an avenue to exhibit their artwork alongside professional and emerging artists from within the community. Over the years, many of our Visual Art students have been recognised through selection for awards of excellence in the prestigious Creative Generation Excellence Awards in Visual Art and the Independent Education Union's Excellence in Art Design Awards and for programmes such as "Design Tracks" for First Nations students and "In Residence" which allow them to gain an appreciation for the breadth of career opportunities in the creative industries.

The annual photography competition, ASHCam, is open to all in the Marist College Ashgrove community, providing further opportunities for

students, parents, relatives, Old Boys and staff to engage in the medium of photography and be recognised for their artistic merit and engagement. Weekly Art Club allows students to engage in art activities and learn new skills in a casual setting outside of the general curriculum.

Creative Industries Week is a celebration of the Arts which sees the Visual Art, Music, Drama and Film and Television departments join forces to present workshops, performances, activities and guest artists for a full week in June each year.

The final event on the Visual Art calendar is the Senior Graduate Visual Art exhibition and awards night which not only highlights the success of our students but provides guests with an opportunity to view the diversity and innovative nature of artwork produced by Marist College Ashgrove students from throughout the year.



Campus Improvements

The College has invested significant time and resources in various campus improvements throughout 2022. This report details the major projects undertaken. Special thanks to the Director of Projects & Infrastructure, Russell Randle, and the Director of Facilities Operations, Matt Tarlinton, and their teams, for their tireless work in seeing these projects through to completion.

MUSIC ROOMS EXTENSION

Construction was completed on the music rooms extension on the lower floor of the Music and Drama Centre. These spaces provide expanded capacity for music lessons, practice and recordings in a state of the art facility. The P&F contributed generous funding raised at the 2022 Walkathon which went towards this fantastic extension to the Music and Drama Centre.

SERVICES BUILDING RE-ROOF

The original 1970's corrugated iron roof pf the Services Building was rusted through in parts and has been replaced with new Colorbond Surf Mist roofing. As well as providing leak free protection from the weather for the Dining room, Kitchen, Services department and Brothers community, the new material and colour provides a more visually appealing outlook from the buildings which overlook it.

ELECTRONIC SCOREBOARD MCMAHON OVAL

The manual scoreboard on McMahon oval has been upgraded to a digital scoreboard. The backing from the old scoreboard will be re-used once new footings and supports are built on Cameron oval later this year. Greg Harten from Hart Sports kindly donated \$50,000 towards the purchase of the new Electronic scoreboard.

ADMIN BUILDING FIRE DETECTION SYSTEM

A recent building insurance audit recommended a new fire detection system in the Admin building which houses a significant number of staff. This system was installed and tested over the Christmas holidays. Following a trial usage period it will be integrated with the College fire management system.

POOL GYM EXPANSION

Based on feedback from staff and students, the decision was made to consolidate the two College gyms which formerly existed at the Pool and in the Champagnat Centre. This work was completed over the Christmas holidays after being started in the Term 3 holidays. Now there is a single destination for strength and conditioning at the Pool, freeing up space for new classrooms in the Champagnat Centre.

















CHAMPAGNAT CENTRE NEW CLASSROOMS

In the space formerly occupied by the gym, two new classrooms have been constructed. These general purpose classrooms can be used for HPE classes or overflow classes from the Secondary school.

STUDENT ADMIN OFFICE REDESIGN

The Student Admin office was redesigned allowing for the arrival of our new Pastoral leaders of Middle and Senior School.

JOHN EALES GRANDSTAND PAINTING

The painting of the John Eales grandstand inside and out included the pressure cleaning of concrete surfaces in and around the seating.

CHAPEL AND RE CENTRE PAINTING

The Chapel and RE Centre has been painted externally. Signage has also been changed to show more prominently the official name of the Chapel. The last stage of this project will be the re-placement of the College crest centred next to the name.

AIR CONDITIONING OF ART ROOMS

The last remaining un-airconditioned classrooms in the College in the Art rooms have now been air-conditioned.

ARBOR WALKWAY LAWN AND ROSE GARDEN


The new arbor walkway and rose garden near the Services and Boarding precinct has significantly improved the visual appeal of this area. In time, Bougainvillea vines will grow over the arbor. The rose garden traditionally associated with this area has been consolidated and re-created with new plants. The large tree has been adorned with solar fairy lights.

CYPRIAN PAVILION REFURBISHMENT

Refurbishment of the Cyprian Pavilion began in late 2022. This project involves extended the floor plan out onto the current deck, with a new deck extension to be added. Tiered concrete seating will extend beyond the deck down to McMahon oval. The internals will be gutted with new floor coverings, wall materials and re-paint, rejuvenated bar area and kitchen, better storage and office space.


NEW PRIMARY BUILDING

Construction on the new Primary building commenced in late November 2022. Footings have been dug and much of the inground services have been completed. The slab pour is expected in March 2023 with much of the structure expected to be built by mid-2023. Project completion is due in early 2024 ahead of a larger Primary student intake in 2024.



Professional Development Initiatives

New staff to Marist College received a specific Marist formation professional development on 9 May 2022.

- In 2022, an additional support program was introduced for new staff members to supplement MCA's existing support systems.
 The program involved an external consultant who conducted interviews with new staff members to assess whether their needs are being addressed and to identify any required followups. The program also comprises regular term meetings and social events, where new staff, their line managers, and buddies gather and interact.
- · CPR skills were updated on 23 June 2022.
- Professional development on a "whole school" approach to ICT development in Stile, Viewboard, MS Teams, TrackOne, Moodle, Stream and other programs to aid in curriculum delivery.
- On May 9, 2022, a program titled "Marist Way 2022 for New Staff" was conducted for recently joined employees of Marist Colleges. The main objective of the program was to enhance their Marist Formation skills.
- All Staff Spirituality Day Scheduled for 28 February 2022 was cancelled due to the floods.
- Regular breakfast professional development sessions in Religious Education and Catholic School identity and Marist Formation were offered to teachers and school officers

- College Senior Leaders together with Religious Education Teachers are pursuing formal qualifications required by the employing authority, and the College is supporting this through provision study days and financial support.
- Some staff who meet the criteria are encouraged by the College to work towards their HAT and LEAD Certification with College financial support.
- Teachers were taking the opportunity to be involved in QCAA Confirmation Training.
- Teaching and non-teaching staff are regularly able to access external professional development opportunities relevant to their work and position.
- ABSA duty of care training is mandatory for all boarding staff, while Senior Supervisors and Boarding Leaders are required to undertake extra training with ABSA.
- Despite the reduced impact of COVID, there was a notable increase in the engagement of professional development among our non-teaching staff. School psychologists, nurses, enrolment personnel, and personal assistants took advantage of the opportunity to enhance their skills and knowledge to better support the school and its students.





In 2022, 97.8% of Year 12 completers from Marist College Ashgrove were engaged in education, training or employment in the year after they completed school.




Of the 178 respondents, 84.3% continued in some recognised form of education and training. The most common study destination was bachelor degree.




A further 13.5% transitioned directly into paid employment and no further study.
